Elliot Dixon, a current Y11 student, has been accepted into one of the most prestigious private schools in the country - Shrewsbury School. It was a neighbour of Elliot who suggested that he apply to study A-Levels at the school. Elliot attended an Open event last summer and was made aware of a course open to students living in Shropshire, with a particular interest in STEM subjects. Elliot decided to enroll and has been part of 'Shrewsbury School's STEM Potential course' since September 2024. He attends the course every 6 weeks and this confirmed his decision to apply to study A-Levels this September. The application process was not for the faint-hearted and required potential students to complete a personal profile, 3 entrance exams conducted over 2 days, formal interviews with the Director of Admissions and a Housemaster and to provide a reference.

Competition for places is highly competitive with applications from students all over the world. Charles Darwin and Sir Michael Palin are just 2 highly successful Shrewsbury School alumni.



Elliot has applied to study A-Levels in Maths, Further Maths, Physics and Chemistry and has chosen to be a boarder. He plans to balance studying by continuing to swim, representing Shropshire. Year 9 Careers in Science Presentation

In November, our Year 9 students who have been demonstrating outstanding progress in Science were treated to an inspiring visit from former student Kaya Tengiz, who returned to school to share his remarkable academic and career journey. His presentation offered students a unique glimpse into the exciting opportunities that can grow from a passion for science.

After leaving our school, Kaya went on to study Astrophysics at Liverpool University, a subject that he was passionate about from an early age. He spoke about the thrill of exploring the mysteries of the universe, from black holes to distant galaxies, and how his time at university opened doors to new academic and personal experiences, particularly his time spent in China.

Following his undergraduate degree, Kaya completed an MA, further deepening his expertise and strengthening his drive to pursue scientific research. He shared with students the importance of perseverance, curiosity, and seeking out opportunities that push you beyond your comfort zone.

Perhaps the most exciting part of his story is what comes next: in January, he will be travelling to Australia to begin a PhD, where he will continue his research in astrophysics. He encouraged students to stay dedicated to their studies, reminding them that their current efforts can shape incredible futures.

The Year 9 audience listened with enthusiasm and asked thoughtful questions, clearly inspired by Kaya's achievements. We are grateful for his visit and proud to see a former student reaching for the stars—quite literally.

Science Club

Our enthusiastic year 7 scientists have been very busy this half term doing lots of interesting experiments and making scientific things.....

- In a fire-based lesson, they did FIRE writing, talked about the fire triangle and saw Mrs Holland set on fire by Dr Steventon, in a spectacular demonstration.
- Making vegetable fat and bird seed feeders to take home to put in their outdoor spaces. A little helping hand for garden birds as the weather turns colder.
- Their first introduction to acids and alkalis using the pH scale and using geranium petals as acid/alkali indicators.
- They made iron filing sparklers for Bonfire Night and Mrs holland demonstrated the ammonium chromate volcano experiment.
- Some scientists dissected owl pellets and were able to identify the mammals that the owls had been eating by comparing bones and skulls to an identification table.
